A MESSAGE FROM THE HEALTH COMMISSIONER & ADMINISTRATOR

Throughout 2022 Geauga Public Health (GPH) saw many changes. Changes that impacted all of us, both employees of GPH and residents of our great county. Changes that impacted our residents no matter the job they hold or the title after their name. Prior to any of these changes the GPH staff ensured that at the core these changes would protect the residents and be of benefit to the residents. A few of the important changes that occurred at GPH in 2022 are:

- Approval and Creation of the Operation and Maintenance (O&M) Program
 - This program will bring GPH into the State of Ohio compliance and will likely be the largest program ever undertaken by GPH.
- Discontinuation of the For Sale of Property program (FSOP)
 - This program would have been a duplication of the O&M program and, in essence, would have charged Geauga residents twice for the same service.
- Worked with Geauga Planning Commission to Change Lot Split Regulations
 - Officially approved in January 2023, GPH worked diligently with Geauga Planning Commission to better serve the public through reduction in fees for lot splits greater than 5 acres. This change should save homeowners who perform a lot split thousands of dollars.
- Website and Social Media Brought to the Forefront
 - GPH has worked diligently to increase transparency and provide more information to the public through our website and social media. Our new website which will go live in 2023 will allow residents to find information much quicker.
- Fee Reductions
 - GPH evaluated its fee structure and found areas that allowed fee reductions through efficiencies that were made throughout the year. These fee reductions did not impact the level of service provided but did reduce the burden put on the community.
- Offering ServSafe Classes
 - GPH hosted its first ServSafe class in many years for a fellow agency at the new Geauga County Administrative building. GPH will continue to host these classes which ensure that local agencies and business who need this service can find it in Geauga and not travel to another county.
- Contract with Ohio EPA (OEPA) for Parkman Water Wells
 - Worked with the Parkman Trustees and resident Mike Derifield to obtain a grant to replace certain wells in Parkman Township that were impacted with salt contamination.

As we move into 2023 and look forward into the future, I see a GPH that is becoming more efficient, more customer focused at all levels, striving to provide the best services possible to the public, and a Board of Health that is invested in protecting the community and ensuring that GPH is a good steward of the tax dollars that the residents of Geauga have provided.

The Board of Health, GPH staff, Health Commissioner Dr. Jeffery Cameron, and I would like to thank our community partners and elected officials who have helped to make what was accomplished this year a possibility. The GPH staff, County Commissioners, County Prosecutor James Flaiz, County Auditor Charles Walder, and Chief Deputy Administrator at the Auditor's Office Frank Antenucci were all vital to ensuring that GPH was able to take steps to better serve the public and continue to be an agency that works for the people of Geauga County.



PROJECT DAWN


Project Dawn is an overdose education and naloxone distribution program. Naloxone is a medication that can reverse an overdose caused by an opioid drug.





CHILDREN WITH MEDICAL HANDICAPS PROGRAM (CMH)

CMH promotes early identification, diagnosis, and treatment of children with special health care needs. Geauga Public Health assists with identifying Geauga County children with special health needs, informing families about the program, and referring children to CMH providers for diagnosis. All of the Geauga Public Health nursing services are approved for every child in the program. There are 3 main components of this program: Diagnosis, Treatment, and Service Coordination.





REPORTABLE INFECTIOUS DISEASE SUMMARY



In 2022, there was an increase in communicable disease cases reported to Geauga Public Health compared to those reported in 2020.

Campylobacteriosis

Cases of Campylobacteriosis stayed stagnant between 2022 and 2021, with 25 cases in 2022. Campylobacteriosis is a foodborne illness caused by a bacteria. It is spread by contaminated foods such as: milk, chicken, turkey, etc.

Campylobacteriosis can be prevented by:

- Wash your hands with soap and water
- Keep raw poultry away from other foods
- Cook poultry to the right temperature (165°F)
- Drink pasteurized milk
- Do not drink untreated water

Influenza-Associated Hospitalization

Cases of Influenza-Associated Hospitalizations increased from 1 to 34 between 2021 and 2022. Influenza is a contagious viral respiratory infection.

Influenza can be prevented by:

- Getting the recommended annual vaccination against influenza
- Avoiding close contact with people who are sick
- Covering your mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing
- Washing your hands often
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth
- Practice other good health habits

Giardiasis

Cases of Giardiasis increased from 5 to 11 between 2021 and 2022. Giardiasis is a foodborne and waterborne illness caused by a parasite. It is spread by coming into contact with contaminated foods or water sources.

Giardiasis can be prevented by:

- Practice good hand hygiene
- Avoid water and food that might be contaminated

Hepatitis **B**

Cases of Hepatitis B increased from 9 to 16 between 2021 and 2022. Hepatitis B is a vaccine-preventable liver infection caused by the Hepatitis B virus. It is spread by contact with contaminated bodily fluids.

Hepatitis B can be prevented by:

- Getting all the vaccinations in the Hepatitis B series
- Wash your hands with soap and water after any potential exposure to blood
- Avoid sharing sharp items such as razors, nail clippers, earrings, or body rings

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

In 2022, The Geuaga Public Health Board of Health ended the long running For Sale of Property program (FSOP). In place for over twenty years, it required all household sewage treatment system to be evaluated when the property was sold. All properties sold or transferred before July 1, 2022 still need to have a Geauga Public Health evaluation to ensure that the system is not creating a public health nuisance.

As the for sale of property program ends, the Ohio Department of Health required Operation and Maintenance program will begin in 2023. This program is an unfunded mandate to track and ensure that all household sewage treatment systems are being properly maintained. Maintenance depends on what type of system a house has, but can be as little as routine pumping of a septic tank.



Geauga Public Health Registered Environment Health Specialists (REHs) are the first line of defense against foodborne illnesses, by inspecting food vendors (Food Service Operations, Food Vending Machines, Mobile Food Operations, and Food Establishments). During an inspection, the Sanitarians look for any health code violations or improper handling of food.


They are also responsible for licensing the all of the food service operations and food establishments in Geauga County.


